20 Years in the Making *U.S. beats Russia to advance to Gold Medal game*

CHIAVENNA---It took 20 long, painful years, but the United States hockey squad took down archrival Russia, 7-3 yesterday in front of a full house—made up mostly of the Red, White and Blue at the Centro Sportivo in Chiavenna.

It was a chippy battle between two experienced teams. Of the 23 men on the U.S. roster, 16 are veterans of international competitions—including bitter losses to Russia in years past.

Led by intensely focused and fearless goalie Jeff Mansfield, the USA fought Russia to a 0-0 stalemate in the first period. The U.S. shot at will, but the Russian goalie was on top of his game.

Three minutes into the second period, Grant Isenbarger decided to shake up the scoreboard with the first USA goal of the game. Barely fifteen seconds later, Garrett Gintoli made it 2-0 in America's favor. Russia scored next, but Peter Gintoli responded with two

consecutive goals in less than a minute to make it 4-1, America.

Russia scored again, making the game interesting. However, Garrett Gintoli was not interested in all, making another score—giving him a hat trick on the day, and the Americans a 5-2 lead.

Russia began to get frustrated. After an especially vicious Russian push, defenseman Miles Gates' head met the boards, splashing blood on the ice. Gates left the rink for the locker room, but returned a few minutes later with 6 stitches on his eyebrow. Anders Lindgren scored late in the third period to wrap up the scoring for the United States. At game's end, the scoreboard read 7-3 in America's favor.

The United States flew into Italy with only one goal in mind—winning a gold medal. With the win yesterday, the USA locks up a spot in the Final. The path has been paved. It will be up to the Americans to walk it.

CHIAVENNA---The U.S. Men's Chess team swept Brazil in the Team tournament yesterday morning with a 4-0 win. Brazil arrived at the table with just 3 players, automatically giving the USA a point. Branton Stewart was the first to conquer the chessboard with his opponent, followed by Oscar Petrov, and finally, Abraham Glasser.

Petrov felt good about his play today. "We both started the opening pretty strong and pretty comfortable. I could tell that my opponent was well-prepared for the first 15 or so moves of the game. But eventually, he slipped under pressure a bit and I was able to infiltrate his space with my Queen. After that, it was easy for me to maneuver my pieces and take control for the win."

As a result of their win against Brazil, the squad took on Bosnia and Herzegovina at 3PM. Board 3 (Stewart) and 4 (Bridges) lost, while Board 2 (Petrov) won. It all came down to Board 1 (Glasser) to bring home the tie. He was leading but his opponent forced a draw. That ended the game with 1.5 points for USA and 2.5 points for Bosnia and Herzegovina.

Curling Outsmarts Japan; still chasing Medal dreams

Third, the USA has to have a better draw to the bottom for the hammer than Ukraine and Korea. If both the USA and Korea win, they will fall into a 3-way tie with Ukraine for 4th place.
